








Annual Report / January 1 - December 31, 2022

A highlight of 2022 was bringing Marcial Cordova, (head bander and biologist at the MoSi station we sponsor in Guatemala) to Minnesota. He told us about the work being done there and how students are trained to assist in catching, banding and documenting specific birds. It's surprising how many birds we have in common and it's important that habitat is preserved both here in the U.S. and on their wintering grounds in Central America. We also connected Marcial with researchers at Hawk Ridge with hopes of future joint raptor monitoring efforts.

We hope you were able to attend some of our free programs which included talks about the birds of Peru, how birds adapt to extreme cold, where Great Blue Herons spend the winter, how to create bird-safe windows,

Cerulean Warblers, Red-shouldered Hawks, and Red-headed Woodpeckers. See our online calendar for 2023 program updates.

Free guided field trips were very popular and hundreds of people were introduced to new birding spots and learned from our experts.

We kept busy!

- We worked with the Rochester Parks
 Dept. to improve local birding areas.
- Our Kestrel nest boxes continue to be used and several chicks were banded.
- We supported infrastructure work to create safer access at two popular birding spots in the Haverhill WMA.
- We led a "Birding by Ear" walk at Chester Woods to help people connect with birds on a deeper level.
- Our volunteers worked "overtime" to restore native plantings and remove invasive species at several area parks. (These people are our heroes!)
- Dozens of kids and adults gave a thumbs up at our Bug Hunt and Monarch Tagging events.
- We did in-person outreach at the Owl Fest, Earthfest, Arbor Day, Olmsted County Fair and other events.
