

Action! Our group may be small, but our volunteers are mighty. Here's how we used your donations last year.

Expert Guided Field Trips

We visited restored prairies, honed our bird song skills at Chester Woods, found rare wildflowers at Root River County Park, watched migrating waterfowl and shorebirds at Armstrong Wetlands, Rice Lake State Park, Cascade Lake and Olmsted County's many reservoirs, searched for warblers in Kutzky Park and Hok-si-la Park, identified spring ephemerals in the Izaak Walton Wetlands, and searched for sparrows and other songbirds at the Rock Dell Wildlife Management Area and Kalmar Reservoir.

We installed bird-safe demonstration windows at the Whitewater State Park Visitor Center. Visit and see 3 different solutions that help prevent birds from dying in window collisions.

We created a "Birding Backpack" which can be borrowed and used on the trails at Oxbow Park.

We supported a MoSi banding station in Guatemala and completed research on constructing a MOTUS receiver station. This MOTUS station will be built in Tikal National Park in 2024 at a cost of nearly \$5,000 - one of the largest projects we have ever taken on - and it couldn't have been accomplished without supporters like you.
